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both students and professors typically assume that the content of introductory psychology textbooks which are empirical in nature are identical to psychology proper

yet what is surprising is how many interesting psychological insights can be found in both philosophy and literature that are often not found in psychology texts such insights are clearly psychological in nature yet they do not go back to any empirical investigation it seems that basic psychology textbooks typically providing the basis for undergraduate and graduate psychology programs represent only one important dimension of psychology empirical psychology but there is no simple co extensive identity between psychology and empirical psychology the philosophical dimension of psychology a beginner s guide begins with an investigation of what constitutes the subject matter of psychology which demonstrates the aspects of psychological reality that are ignored missed or at times even theoretically denied by mainline contemporary psychology if they lack an empirical warrant such matters include inner conscious experience the world of intrinsic value as well as the higher uniquely personal dimension of human nature that is of intellect and will this book therefore offers a more complete survey of the entire sphere of psychological reality which could provide the context for more properly interpreting empirical psychological phenomena for example should we understand psychological conditioning principles within a broader context of personal freedom is a person more rightly conceived in a psychologically immanent way that is oriented simply toward the fulfillment of instincts and needs or is there as well a transcendent orientation oriented to truth and meaning should we understand psychology simply from the point of view of efficient causation or do we need to also take into account final causation it will be of interest to psychology students of either undergraduate or graduate level and of great use to those with no prior knowledge of philosophy

excerpt from a beginner s psychology psychological text books usually contain a chapter on the physiology of the central nervous system the reader will find no such chapter here for i hold and have always held that the student should get his elementary knowledge of neurology not at second hand from the psychologist but at first hand from the physi ologist i have added to every chapter a list of ques tions looking partly to increase of knowledge but especially to a test of the reader s understanding of what he has just read i have also added a list of references for further reading it depends upon the maturity and general mental habit of the student whether these references made as they are in many cases to authors who do not agree either with one another or with the text of the book should be followed up at once or only after the text itself has been digested the decision must be left to the instructor my own opinion is that beginners are best given one thing at a time and that the knowledge questions and the references should therefore in the ordinary run of teaching be postponed until some feeling for psychology some steadiness of psycho logical attitude has become apparent about the publisher forgotten books publishes hundreds of thousands of rare

the science of human nature a psychology for beginners by william henry pyle with class exercises there are at least two possible approaches to the study of psychology by teacher training students in high schools and by beginning students in normal schools one of these is through methods of teaching and subject matter the other aims to give the simple concrete facts of psychology as the science of the mind the former presupposes a close relationship between psychology and methods of teaching and assumes that psychology is studied chiefly as an aid to teaching the latter is less complicated the plan contemplates the teaching of the simple fundamentals at first

and applying them incidentally as the occasion demands this latter point of view is in the main the point of view taken in the text the author has taught the material of the text to high school students to the end that he might present the fundamental facts of psychology in simple form you are beginning the study of human nature you cannot study human nature from a book you must study yourself and your neighbors this book may help you to know what to look for and to understand what you find but it can do little more than this it is true this text gives you many facts learned by psychologists but you must verify the statements or at least see their significance to you or they will be of no worth to you however the facts considered here properly understood and assimilated ought to prove of great value to you but perhaps of greater value will be the psychological frame of mind or attitude which you should acquire the psychological attitude is that of seeking to find and understand the causes of human action and the causes consequences and significance of the processes of the human mind if your first course in psychology teaches you to look for these things gives you some skill in finding them and in using the knowledge after you have it your study should be quite worth while this book is written for young students in high schools and normal schools no knowledge can be of more use to a young person than a knowledge of himself no study can be more valuable to him than a study of himself a study of the laws of human behavior that is the purpose of this book what is human nature like why do we act as we do how can we make ourselves different how can we make others different how can we make ourselves more efficient how can we make our lives more worth while this book is a manual intended to help young people to obtain such knowledge of human nature as will enable them to answer these questions i have not attempted to write a complete text on psychology there are already many such books and good ones too i have selected for treatment only such topics as young students can study with interest and profit i have tried to keep in mind all the time the practical worth of the matters discussed and the ability and experience of the intended readers

british author edward titchener s introductory psychology book first published in 1915 is a text the author himself would have found useful when beginning his own study of the subject some 30 years earlier it was a paragraph in james mill the most unpsychological of psychologists that set him on this introspective track and titchener aims to saved his readers in his words a great deal of labour and vexation of spirit while there is an inordinately long introduction titchener is hoping the reader learns to be clear and definite in his objections realising his own point of view and sticking to it in working out later his own psychological system each chapter comes with a list of questions testing the reader s understanding of what he has just read and supplemented with a list of references for further reading confined to works available in the english language titchener avoids the term consciousness a word he feels is

slippery and better discarded

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
