moral philosophy is the study of what morality is and what it requires of us as socrates said it s about how we ought to live and why it would be helpful if we could begin with a simple uncontroversial definition of what morality is unfortunately we cannot there are many rival theories each expounding a different conception of what it means to live morally and any definition that goes beyond socrates s simple formula tion is bound to offend at least one of them this should make us cautious but it need not paralyze us in this chapter i will describe the minimum conception of morality

problems from philosophy is an introductory text organized around the great philosophical problems the existence of god the nature of the mind human freedom the limits of knowledge and the truth about ethics it begins by reflecting on the life of the first great philosopher socrates then it takes up the fundamental question of whether god exists next comes a discussion of death and the soul which leads to a chapter about persons the later chapters consider whether objective knowledge is possible in science and ethics problems from philosophy represents the final work of philosopher james rachels in it he brings the same liveliness and

this edited volume demonstrates that a virtue centered approach to the ethical life is a consistent feature of william james s moral reasoning from the 1880s until his death in 1910 little else however seems constant within james s writings on moral philosophy and the ethical life and this lack of constancy is what keeps james s work of interest more than a century later

many ethicists either accept the reflective equilibrium method or think that anything goes in ethical theorizing as long as the results are plausible the aim of this book is to advance methodological thinking in ethics beyond these common attitudes and to raise new methodological questions about how moral philosophy should be done what are we entitled to assume as the starting point of our ethical inquiry what is the role of empirical sciences in ethics is there just one general method for

doing moral philosophy or should different questions in moral philosophy be answered in different ways are there argumentative structures and strategies that we should be encouraged to use or typical argumentative patterns that we should avoid this volume brings together leading moral philosophers to consider these questions the chapters investigate the prospects of empirical ethics outline new methods of ethics evaluate recent methodological advances and explore whether different areas of moral philosophy are methodologically continuous or independent of one another the aim of methodology and moral philosophy is to make moral philosophers more self aware and reflective of the way in which they do moral philosophy and also to encourage them to take part in methodological debates

in our current social landscape moral questions about economic disparity disadvantaging biases and scarcity are rightly receiving attention with a sense of urgency this book argues that classical pragmatism offers a compelling and useful account of our engagement with moral life the key arguments are first that a broader reading of the pragmatist tradition than is usually attempted within the context of ethical theory is necessary and second that this broad reading offers resources that enable us to move forward in contemporary debates about truth and principles in moral life the first argument is made by demonstrating that there is an arc of theoretical unity that stretches from two key founders of pragmatism charles sanders peirce and william james through the work of john dewey and clarence irving lewis the second argument is made by engaging with contemporary debates concerning the truth status of the judgments and assertions made in ordinary moral discourse as well as the role and nature of moral principles toward a pragmatist metaethics will be of interest to scholars of american philosophy american intellectual history and moral and political theorists as well as anyone interested in the contours and demands of shared moral discourse

the pragmatic turn in philosophy explores how the various discursive strategies of old and new pragmatisms are related and what their pertinence is to the relationship between pragmatism and philosophy as a whole the contributors bridge the divide between analytic and continental philosophy through a transcontinental desire to work on common problems in a common philosophical language irrespective of which side of the divide one stands on pragmatic philosophy has gained ascendancy over the traditional concerns of a representationalist epistemology that has determined much of the intellectual and cultural life of modernity this book details how contemporary philosophy will emerge from this recognition and that in fact this emergence is already underway

the growing literature on environmental ethics has ballooned into a separate sub field within philosophy involving ethical studies concerning the value of other species of ecosystems and of the environment of all living things as a whole some consider environmental ethics to be a revolution in ethics which will completely change the human centered orientation of morals and reorient it to include all species ecosystems or the larger biosphere this volume explores pragmatist approaches to ethics that can be used for environmental issues pragmatism may provide both a more defensible theory of non anthropomorphic and intrinsic value than other ethical schools and more generally supply an alternative model of what environmental philosophy could be the holism of pragmatists constitutes a challenge to value and ethics centered in the individual and a useful ground for more holistic theories of value which some have argued is more suitable to an environmental as opposed to a humane ethic the authors of this book defend their understandings of pragmatism in the course of explaining contemporary ways to reconstruct central foundations to environmental ethics

the world of moral theory finds no place for the idea of integrity the natural intellectual home of the idea of integrity is the american pragmatist tradition pragmatism makes possible an account of integrity that enables it to become philosophically central in thinking about morality the idea of integrity enables what dewey called a working theory of morality other intellectual traditions including those most prominent in the academic world of moral philosophy ignore integrity because of its imprecision and its inability to deliver precise answers to questions about what is right or wrong good or bad recovering integrity moral thought in american pragmatism explains how integrity can and should become central in philosophical thought about morality only within the intellectual tradition of american pragmatism may integrity achieve the intellectual stature it deserves as the central idea in ordinary moral thought the ideas of morally diverse communities are unified to a remarkable extent when seen through the moral lens of integrity diverse communities having diverse ways of life share similar understandings of morality these similarities are important for understanding what morality fundamentally is in the human world philosophical efforts to explain the nature of morality or the nature of right action or the nature of the good founder on their ignorance of moral diversity in the real worlds of human history and culture
